Learn, Respect and Succeed (LRS)

Computing News:

Key stage 3 students have had their second taste of ICT, big thank you to Mr Ali for writing a New Scheme of learning to capture the imagination of our young minds. Students in year 8 and 9 have had the chance to explore skills needed for the workplace – spreadsheets and now Microsoft Word (all the skills you need for generating professional documents). We are returning to the computing curriculum where students are again starting to explore python scripting designing their own algorithms and developing their problem-solving skills. Our Year 10 students have been out and about, big thank you to Steve Lunt who allowed our budding programmers to celebrate the end of their networking block of study by a visit to our server room, hear about the experience of our technician, and see our stacks.

OCR computing has just released its new digital computing mock (pilot scheme), with students sitting this for the first time. This is extremely exciting that we are finally providing students with an assessment environment akin to what they will see in the workplace (and we expect to see either replacing entirely or sitting beside the paper-based examination in the future). Good luck to all our year 11 students taking this for the first time.

We have our annual Cyber Security Day coming up on Monday 27th March with digital Jersey and Small Piece trust coming into school to deliver a day of hacking for selected students. The day promises to be brilliant with students tasked with Digital Forensics, Cyber Security, Password Security, Open-Source Intelligence, Social Engineering, Encryption, Device Hacking, all topics linked to the national curriculum. De Le Salle School will be in from 12:30 to do afternoon of Cyber Security Hosted in the same location.

Whole School IT:

We have invested time and energy into making sure that our Music room has the latest and simple to use equipment for our enthusiastic musicians. The music practice rooms have been sound proofed, new state of the art surround sound speakers for singing/recording students, and a Smart board with apple TV for garage band and compositions. Students will be using the new mixing desk and recording studio for compositions.

Smart boards have gone up in multiple classrooms across the site (with more classrooms with these fantastic teaching tools than without now) as well students benefiting from new PC investment in photography suite and COM2, where majority of ICT is taught. We are piloting mobile teaching (with handheld tablet devices), with staff able to move round the classroom to work with students, showcasing student work on the board and marking electronically in real time. Each department has their own laptop bank with students continuing to build up their Microsoft Teams skills in a safe secure environment. We are constantly looking at new ideas, sharing IT teaching and learning best practice, with our own IT CPD weekly published on staff team. Big thank you to the many teaching staff helping to support colleagues in developing their IT skills, particularly the MFL team who continue to help drive IT creativity.

Hearing and Deaf Support Team (HDST) @ LRS:

Spring has Sprung! It really is great to look out of the windows and see the daffodils and rain! But this means it will not be long until we are basking in wonderful sunny weather (fingers crossed).

We have had a busy time in the A.R.C HDST, from teaching our Introduction to British Sign Language to Y7 and Basic conversation for Y8 pupils as well as raising deaf awareness around the school with various Deaf related topics. We have just celebrated British Sign Language week in school, which was a great success. B.S.L information was on the school screens as well as information to the Form Tutors to share. We are immensely proud that our B.S.L lessons are timetabled, which means over the past 4 years we have taught around 1,100 students! We have had the pleasure of seeing all our students blossom and become more aware in many wonderful ways. Confidence in what they can achieve and then, to use their skills in their social interactions and in future work situations. We celebrate small wins as well as the amazing successes that our DHOH (Deaf and Hard of Hearing) students achieve, as well as the wider school community.



We were very happy when the B.S.L Act finally went through in April 2022. This means B.S.L is now legally recognised by the British Government as a language in it's own right. It is now a legal requirement to accommodate B.S.L users to allow equal access from work, healthcare, and education. The term Deaf (with a capital D) refers to people of all ages who sign B.S.L, or acquire B.S.L later in life, as a primary or preferred language and identify in any way with the lived experience of being Deaf.
