## Uniform:

There has been much written in the press about one of our uniform suppliers closing. In the background I have been working hard to ensure our supply of uniform is secure and, most importantly for me, accessible locally. I am pleased to confirm that **Lyndale Sports** will continue to supply our uniform. I will be working with Lyndale to ensure we meet the new uniform policy. The number of branded items we have is limited, but we will still review our items over the next 2 years to meet the new policy. I will continue to look for a second supplier, but at the moment this would be a UK supplier which brings with it hidden issues of accessibility to try items on, costs of delivery and returning items which do not fit (around £4.99 per item each way) along with other implications which need to be looked at carefully as these costs mount up for families.

JSSK at Le Quennevais are still selling our uniform until they close, so please call in.

## Toilets:

Toilets might be an odd topic to communicate home about but it is an important area that we have been discussing a lot in school, especially with students and I have mentioned this in previous newsletters. A few years back our Student Council started to look at where students felt uncomfortable, where bullying could take place and where we needed to improve facilities due to age and wear. Our toilets kept coming up in student voice surveys and it's come up regularly since then. The School Council has worked on exploring these issues and have come to the conclusion that the design of the toilets needs to be changed and the toilets themselves were dated and needed refreshing. The toilets design makes it difficult for staff to supervise adequately, and some students seem to use the area as a social place due to being 'out of sight'. This social gathering then makes others uncomfortable. While our main toilets are behind two sets of doors, we also have many single toilets which open direct onto the corridors, and these are preferred due to their design. Other Island schools are slightly ahead of us on this journey and have already converted their main toilets to a more modern design which has reduced the issues and concerns in those schools.


Having worked with the previous Student Council, plans are progressing (see below) to open up our toilet areas, move to closed cubicles with floor to ceiling sides and increase the number of toilets overall via better use of the space.

Our next step will be to plan for the works to happen over a holiday as the changes will be substantial due to the increase in cubicles. If availability of builders means we do this in term time, we will hire in portable loos and the works will be managed. Both students and staff feel these changes will make a significant difference, therefore we need to get the work done in conjunction with Jersey Property Holdings.

While on the subject of buildings, we continue to work hard on replacing our aging sports block. This block opened in 1975 and is well past its prime. When I have a progress update to share, we will be in touch.

# Whole School IT:

By the end of the upcoming half term break, new Smart Boards will have been installed in every teaching room in the school. This is a significant improvement on the old projectors and the functionality of these boards means students see learning materials more easily and the interactivity offers teachers lots of different ways to present information in an engaging way. We are constantly looking at new ideas, sharing IT teaching and learning best practice, with our own IT CPD weekly published on staff team. A big thank you to the many teaching staff helping to support colleagues in developing their IT skills, particularly the MFL team who continue to help drive IT creativity.
